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What are the top 5 things you should consider if you are thinking about using AI to write your papers?

O1. Submitting Al-generated content as your own work can be considered <u>academic misconduct</u>. Advice: Check the course syllabus and ask your professor about Al use in each class. If permitted, properly <u>cite Al-generated work</u>. O2. Relying on Al to write your papers will leave you ill-prepared and stressed for timed or in-class tests.

Advice: Practice writing your own ideas and <u>visit the Writing Peers online or in the</u> <u>Library</u> to develop a strong academic style and voice in your writing.

03. Relying on AI to produce answers can result in underdeveloped academic skills, making you unprepared for tests, class discussions, future assignments, and career readiness.

Advice: Use AI as a tool to help you brainstorm ideas, clarify knowledge, understand complex concepts, and <u>visit the Learning Peers online or in the Library</u> to develop strong learning and time management skills.

Al can "hallucinate," providing inaccurate and made-up information and references.

Advice: Double-check references and facts to ensure all information is correct and online CHAT with Library research assistance to find good sources.

05. Al does not know class content, nor your professor's expectations, so it can only provide general, non-specific information.

Advice: Carefully read the assignment instructions, grading rubric, and learning outcomes before accepting any Al suggestions.

Advice from ChatGPT: "Using human help that's within university guidelines is often more tailored and safer than relying on generic Al outputs."

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
